**DIRECTIONS TO THE MONASTERY**

***From Highway 101 – Exit Hwy 126 East at Ventura.***

*Travel 11 miles east along Hwy 126 and exit 10th St/Hwy 150 at Santa Paula.  
Turn left from the exit ramp and follow 10th St/Hwy 150 through Santa Paula.  
Bear right at the fork in the road. This is Ojai Rd/Hwy 150.  
Travel about five miles (1/4 mile past Thomas Aquinas College) to 15799 Ojai Road.  
The monastery driveway is on the right just past our mailbox at Highway Marker 2830.  
Drive across the bridge and follow the signs to the parking area.*

***From Highway 5 – Exit Hwy 126 West at Santa Clarita.***

*Travel 27 miles to Santa Paula, and exit at 10th St/Hwy 150.  
Turn right from the exit ramp and follow 10th St/Hwy 150 through Santa Paula.  
Bear right at the fork in the road. This is Ojai Rd/Hwy 150.  
Continue as directed above.*



Dear Friends of St. Barbara Monastery,

We have been thinking—with much prayer—about the future of our monastery...

Earlier this month, we marked the one-year anniversary of the consecration of our beautiful, new monastery chapel. This prompted us to give more serious thought to the question of ‘What comes next?’ as well as to more general future plans for development.

‘What comes next’ turns out to be not a choice but rather fulfillment of two requirements regarding our property. The first is a requirement of our mortgage lender, who exacted a promise from us, when we refinanced the monastery property last summer, to pursue a conditional use permit from the County of Ventura for our infant burial ground. We are presently in the application stage for this, and hope to include in the scope of the permit a cemetery to be located at the northwest corner of our property (presently the upper lavender field). We do not anticipate this project to be costly, because it involves no construction.

The second requirement comes from the Ventura County Fire Dept. When our chapel construction plans were approved five years ago, the Fire Dept. stipulated as a safety requirement that prior to any further construction our bridge would have to be enlarged to accommodate two lanes. Fulfillment of this requirement will be costly and will make some serious fundraising a requirement as well.

Once we fulfill these two requirements, our plan is to address what has long been a pressing need for more space to accommodate sisters and guests. What we envisioned, even before we began building the chapel, was a two-storey wing attached to the north wall of our main house. We already have architectural drawings for this, which propose a design of three attached modules, each with room for four more persons. This project will be major and will require major fund raising, but it is essential if St. Barbara Monastery is to develop.

We ask you to add your prayers to ours that these plans (or better ones!) might be found worthy of God’s blessing and bear good fruit. And we ask that, should you have reflections or suggestions for us concerning them, you not hesitate to let us hear your ideas.

But we will still have a booth there on June 30<sup>th</sup>, where we will be selling our lavender sachets, lip balm, hydrosol, dried bouquets and loose lavender from last year's harvest and other products.

## ***AN INVITATION TO THE CHILDREN***

On June 19<sup>th</sup> at 10:30 AM the Ojai Raptor Center will be bringing some of their birds to our monastery for a special presentation about owls, hawks, vultures and other raptors. All children and their parents, who would like to come, see and learn about these remarkable birds, are welcome. There is no admission fee.

The Ojai Raptor Center accepts for rehabilitation raptors that have suffered injuries.



When the birds recover and are deemed capable of caring for themselves and living in the wild, they are returned to the area where they were first found. Pictured at left is a caregiver introducing a great horned owl to a group of eager summer school students at the monastery.

We first got to know the people at the Ojai Raptor Center when a baby owl, who must have fallen out of his nest high up in a sycamore tree on our property, was found by one of the sisters on the ground and unable to fly. The Raptor Center sent someone to get the baby owl and take it back to the Raptor Center. A long time later, when it had grown into a fine, mature owl, our owl was returned to us and released among the big trees in the area of our upper lavender field.
