

DIRECTIONS TO THE MONASTERY

From Highway 101 - Exit Hwy 126 East at Ventura.

Travel 11 miles east along Hwy 126 and exit 10th St/Hwy 150 at Santa Paula. Turn left from the exit ramp and follow 10th St/Hwy 150 through Santa Paula. Bear right at the fork in the road. This is Ojai Rd/Hwy 150.

Travel about five miles (1/4 mile past Thomas Aquinas College) to 15799 Ojai Road. The monastery driveway is on the right just past our mailbox at Highway Marker 2830. Drive across the bridge and follow the signs to the parking area.

From Highway 5 – Exit Hwy 126 West at Santa Clarita.

Travel 27 miles to Santa Paula, and exit at 10th St/Hwy 150.

Turn right from the exit ramp and follow 10th St/Hwy 150 through Santa Paula.

Bear right at the fork in the road. This is Ojai Rd/Hwy 150.

Continue as directed above.



Dear Friends of St. Barbara Monastery,

When, God-willing, we have our next Friends' Gathering on March 25th, we will have concluded the liturgical celebration of the Feast of the Annunciation. But Christians from the beginning were aware of even more significance belonging to this date than this Great Feast.

The Jews regarded March 25th as the date of the creation of the world-- an idea which the early Christians accepted. (Not so naïve an idea as it might appear at first glance.) Moreover, this was exactly the date of the Crucifixion of our Lord. (The date on the Jewish calendar is the 14th of Nisan, which corresponds to March 25th.) In the early centuries, Christians in some places even celebrated Pascha on this date--before the formula for determining the date of Pascha was set by the 1st Ecumenical Council. Then, March 25th is exactly nine months before the Nativity of Christ. Thus, it is no accident that the Church chose this date of March 25th to commemorate the Annunciation--although this was done only after the date of Christmas had been well established. "Today is the beginning of our salvation...," we sing with joy. (Troparion of Annunciation).

This information about the significance of the date helps illumine the hymnography of the Feast. While the hymnography focuses on the Virgin's exuberant response to the Archangel—(itself a hymn, the *Magnificat*), it reflects the theological vision of the Church. It was the hymnographers' gift of grace to understand this vision and the deep connections between the creation (and, by implication, the Fall), the Angel's announcement (the beginning of the new creation, that is, the Conception of Jesus Christ), and the Crucifixion (as finishing the work of that creation.)
